

Monday, March 23, 1981

The Speaker took the Chair at 1:30 p.m.

## YUKON LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY

24th Legislative Assembly

Fourth Session

Tuesday, March 24, 1981

The Speaker informed the Assembly that he had received a communication from the Commissioner in his capacity as Lieutenant-Governor stating that he would open the Session at 3:00 p.m. today, Tuesday, the 24th day of March, 1981.

The Commissioner, the Hon. Doug Bell, entered the Chamber and, having taken his seat upon the Dais, was pleased to open the Session with the following speech:

MR. SPEAKER, TODAY IT IS MY PRIVILEGE TO APPEAR BEFORE YOU AT THIS, THE OPENING OF THE FOURTH SESSION OF THE TWENTY FOURTH COUNCIL. MR. SPEAKER, IT IS WORTHY OF NOTE THAT THIS IS THE FIRST TIME I HAVE ADDRESSED THE LEGISLATURE SINCE MY APPOINTMENT AS COMMISSIONER AND IT IS THE FIRST TIME THAT THE COMMISSIONER HAS DELIVERED THE THRONE SPEECH SINCE YUKON DEVELOPED FULL CABINET STYLE GOVERNMENT.

I AM PLEASED TO NOTE THAT THE POLITICAL AND CONSTITUTIONAL DEVELOPMENTS WHICH HAVE OCCURRED OVER THE PAST YEAR BODE WELL FOR YUKON. WE HAVE MADE GREAT STRIDES ON BEHALF OF ALL YUKONERS AND TO THAT END OUR CANADIAN NEIGHBORS TO THE SOUTH HAVE ACHIEVED A GREATER UNDERSTANDING OF YUKON, OUR ASPIRATIONS AND OUR GOALS. IT IS IMPORTANT, MR. SPEAKER, THAT CANADIANS UNDERSTAND EACH OTHER AND BEGIN WORKING TOGETHER. MY GOVERNMENT HAS WORKED HARD TO ENSURE YUKON GETS A VOICE IN NATIONAL ISSUES WHICH AFFECT US AND ALL ALONG WE HAVE MADE IT CLEAR THAT WE WANT NO MORE THAN WHAT IS RIGHTFULLY OURS AS CITIZENS OF A DEMOCRATIC CANADA.

1980, MR. SPEAKER, WAS A YEAR FOR STABILIZATION IN OUR ECONOMY. THROUGHOUT MOST OF 1979 OUR ECONOMY WAS IN A STATE OF ECONOMIC RECESSION BUT IN EARLY 1980 THE DOWNWARD TREND BEGAN TO EASE, STABILIZING BY THE MIDDLE OF THE YEAR, ALBEIT AT A SOMEWHAT LOWER LEVEL OF ACTIVITY THAN PREVIOUSLY, BUT BY LATE 1980 IT WAS IN THE INITIAL STAGES OF RECOVERY. A NUMBER OF FACTORS DURING THE YEAR HAVE CONTRIBUTED TO THIS SITUATION. FIRST, RISING METAL PRICES STIMULATED SIGNIFICANTLY INCREASED ACTIVITY IN THE MINING INDUSTRY. MINERAL EXPLORATION WAS BOOMING AS EXPENDITURES TOPPED FORTY MILLION DOLLARS IN 1980, A PHENOMENAL FORTY SIX PERCENT INCREASE OVER THE RECORD 27.6 MILLION DOLLARS SPENT IN 1979. THE CONTINUING SPECULATION ON THE COMMODITY MARKET FOR PRECIOUS METALS LED TO A FRANTIC SEARCH FOR GOLD IN THE TERRITORY/ A NEW KLONDIKE GOLD RUSH. CYPRUS ANVIL MINING CORPORATION BEGAN WORK ON ITS 240 MILLION DOLLAR PLANT EXPANSION AND UNITED KENO HILL BEGAN THE CONSTRUCTION PHASE FOR RE-OPENING THE OLD VENUS GOLD MINE ON THE B.C./YUKON BORDER. IT IS EXPECTED THAT THIS PROPERTY WILL BE IN PRODUCTION BY AUGUST OF THIS YEAR AND WILL EMPLOY BETWEEN FIFTY AND ONE HUNDRED PERMANENT EMPLOYEES. SECOND, 1980 WAS A PLEASANT SURPRISE FOR OUR TOURISM INDUSTRY. ORIGINALLY, MANY PEOPLE WERE PREDICTING A DRAMATIC DECLINE IN TOURISM ACTIVITY.

HOWEVER, DESPITE RAPIDLY ESCALATING TRAVEL COSTS
EVERYWHERE, THE NUMBER OF TOURISTS AND THE ACTIVITY
THEY GENERATED HAS SURPASSED EXPECTATIONS. WHILE
THE ACTUAL NUMBER OF BORDER CROSSINGS HAS DECLINED
SLIGHTLY, INCOME TO THE TERRITORY WAS HIGHER AS PEOPLE
ARE STAYING LONGER AND SPENDING MORE IN THE TERRITORY.

THIRD, A MAJOR IMPETUS WAS MADE IN 1980 TO THE DIVERSIFICATION OF OUR ECONOMY AS A MAJOR EXPANSION IN THE FOREST INDUSTRY COMMENCED. CATTERMOLE INDUSTRIES OF WATSON LAKE HAVE DOUBLED THE SIZE OF THEIR FACILITY AND ADDED A NUMBER OF NEW EMPLOYEES. IN ADDITION, THE CONSTRUCTION OF A DRY KILN ALLOWS THE COMPANY TO SIGNIFICANTLY EXPAND ITS MARKETS PARTICULARLY TO ALASKA.

FINALLY, THE YUKON GOVERNMENT INTRODUCED
AN AGGRESSIVE POLICY OF ASSISTING ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT
IN THE TERRITORY. DURING 1980, WE SIGNED A NUMBER OF
COST-SHARED AGREEMENTS WITH CANADA. WE HAVE APPROVED
EXPENDITURES OF APPROXIMATELY 5.1 MILLION DOLLARS FOR
THE TOURISM INDUSTRY, INCLUDING THE SKI CHALET WHICH
WAS COMPLETED A WEEK AGO FOR HOSTING THE VERY SUCCESSFUL
WORLD CUP OF CROSS COUNTRY SKIING. THE EXPENDITURE OF
1,3 MILLION DOLLARS ON THE SKI CHALET, WE FEEL,
CONTRIBUTED TO THE SMALL UPSURGE IN CONSTRUCTION
ACTIVITY THIS PAST YEAR WHICH SAW EMPLOYMENT INCREASE
BY SOME THREE PERCENT, AND WE ARE CONFIDENT IT WILL
STIMULATE THE OFF SEASON TRAVEL MARKET.

THE GOVERNMENTAL PROGRAM WHICH I PRESENTED
TO YOU IN MARCH OF 1980 HAS FOR THE MOST PART BEEN
FOLLOWED WITH SOME EXCEPTIONS OVER WHICH WE HAVE HAD
NO CONTROL. MY GOVERNMENT HAS DELIVERED ON THE
COMMITMENTS IT MADE AND INTENDS TO DO THE SAME IN
RESPECT TO THE PLANS I WILL LAY BEFORE YOU TODAY.
WE ARE A GOVERNMENT CLOSE TO THE PEOPLE AND, MOST
IMPORTANT OF ALL, WE LISTEN TO WHAT THE PEOPLE ARE
TELLING US. IT HAS NOT ALWAYS BEEN EASY BUT PARTY
POLITICS IS PROVING TO BE THE VEHICLE THAT IS FINALLY
BRINGING GOVERNMENT ACCOUNTABILITY TO YUKONERS, AND
YOU CAN BE ASSURED THAT MY GOVERNMENT INTENDS TO
FOLLOW THIS PRACTICE IN THE FUTURE.

THIS GOVERNMENT, MR. SPEAKER, INTENDS TO
BUILD A STRONG FRAME ON THE BASE OF OUR ACHIEVEMENTS
IN 1980 AND WE INTEND TO REDOUBLE OUR EFFORTS AT
DEVELOPING OUR ECONOMIC STRUCTURE AND ENSURING THE
OPPORTUNITY OF YUKONERS TO TAKE ADVANTAGE OF THE
EXPECTED ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT IN YUKON OVER THE NEXT
DECADE. IN 1981, WE WILL INCREASE OUR EFFORTS TO
FOSTER PRIVATE SECTOR INVESTMENT IN OUR ECONOMY THROUGH
PROGRAMS SUCH AS THE BUSINESS DEVELOPMENT ASSISTANCE
PROGRAM WHICH WE ANTICIPATE WILL BE IN FULL OPERATION
EARLY IN THE FISCAL YEAR, AND THROUGH THE EXPANDED
EFFORTS OF THE TOURISM INCENTIVE PROGRAM.

ECONOMIC PLANNING AND POLICY FORMULATION WILL CONTINUE TO FOCUS ATTENTION ON MINERAL AND ENERGY DEVELOPMENT. IN 1981 WE INTEND TO HOLD A SECOND MINERAL SYMPOSIUM AND TO CONTINUE THE MINERAL TASK FORCE TO ENSURE THE PROPER DEVELOPMENT OF OUR RESOURCES. WE EXPECT TO COMPLETE OUR INTENSIVE INVESTIGATION INTO THE ENERGY SITUATION IN YUKON AND TO BE ABLE TO PRESENT TO THE LEGISLATURE A LONG-TERM ENERGY POLICY FOR YUKON. AND WE EXPECT A NUMBER OF MAJOR TOURISM PROJECTS APPROVED IN 1980 TO BE COMPLETED IN THIS YEAR.

THIS GOVERNMENT HAS CONSISTENTLY STATED ITS COMMITMENT TO THE PRESERVATION OF THE WHITE PASS AND YUKON RAILWAY AS AN ENERGY EFFICIENT TOOL FOR ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT IN YUKON. THE GOVERNMENT OF YUKON FIRMLY BELIEVES THAT THE RAILWAY CAN BE A VIABLE ENTITY IN THE LONGER TERM PROVIDED SHORT-TERM FINANCIAL ASSISTANCE IS FORTHCOMING, AFTER A YEAR OF INTENSIVE NEGOTIATION BETWEEN THIS GOVERNMENT, THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT, WHITE PASS AND YUKON ROUTE RAILWAY, CYPRUS ANVIL MINING, AND THE GOVERNMENT OF ALASKA, AN AGREEMENT HAS BEEN REACHED IN WHICH THE GOVERNMENT OF YUKON WILL PROVIDE ASSISTANCE TOTALLING ONE MILLION DOLLARS TO THE WHITE PASS AND YUKON RAILWAY. THIS LOAN WILL BE-REPAID OVER A TWENTY-YEAR PERIOD AND WILL PROVIDE A MECHANISM WHEREBY THE LONG-TERM VIABILITY OF THE RAILWAY CAN BE ENSURED WITH A MINIMAL INVESTMENT OF PUBLIC FUNDS.

AS PART OF THE TERMS OF PROVIDING THESE FUNDS, THE GOVERNMENT OF YUKON IS REQUESTING ONE SEAT ON THE BOARD OF THE WHITE PASS AND YUKON CORPORATION.

MR. SPEAKER, THE DEPARTMENT OF TOURISM AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT WILL CONTINUE WITH ITS ENERGY CONSERVATION PROGRAMS AS WELL AS ITS EFFORTS TO PROMOTE TOURISM. THE DEPARTMENT, IN ADDITION TO THESE AND OTHER ACTIVITIES, IS INVOLVED WITH THE MINING INDUSTRY IN THE FORMULATION OF A YUKON MINERAL POLICY. COUPLED WITH THE ENERGY POLICY PRESENTLY BEING DEVELOPED, THE MINERAL POLICY WILL GIVE YUKON THE LONG OVERDUE DIRECTION THAT PAST GOVERNMENTS HAVE BEEN UNABLE TO PROVIDE.

MR. SPEAKER, WE HAVE EXPANDED OUR COMMITMENT TO YUKON'S TOURISM INDUSTRY THROUGH THE SECONDMENT OF JOHN KOSTELNIK, A SENIOR TOURISM DEVELOPMENT OFFICER, TO THE YUKON VISITORS' ASSOCIATION. YUKON'S SECOND LARGEST INDUSTRY HAS TREMENDOUS POTENTIAL, AND WE ARE ENCOURAGED WITH THE COOPERATION THAT EXISTS BETWEEN GOVERNMENT AND INDUSTRY IN EFFORTS TO REALIZE THAT POTENTIAL. AN ACHIEVEMENT OF SIGNIFICANT INTEREST WILL BE THIS GOVERNMENT'S HOSTING OF THE FEDERAL/PROVINCIAL MINISTERS OF TOURISM CONFERENCE IN SEPTEMBER OF 1981.

WE ARE OPTIMISTIC THAT THESE AND OTHER EVENTS WILL TRIGGER A SIGNIFICANT RECOVERY PERIOD THROUGHOUT 1981 AS OUR ECONOMY BEGINS TO REBUILD TO ITS PRE-1978 LEVELS. OUR OPTIMISM IS BASED ON A WIDE RANGE OF FACTORS. PROJECTIONS THAT METAL PRICES WILL REMAIN AT REASONABLE LEVELS ARE EXPECTED TO GIVE ENCOURAGEMENT TO THE INDUSTRIES TO OPEN MAJOR NEW MINES. IN PARTICULAR, A POSITIVE DECISION BY AMAX TO BEGIN CONSTRUCTION OF THE MACTUNG MINE IN THE MACMILLAN PASS AREA WOULD ADD A SIGNIFICANT BOOST TO OUR ECONOMY. THE RESURGENCE OF PLACER MINING AS A SIGNIFICANT ECONOMIC FACTOR IS ANTICIPATED AS THE RESURRECTED GOLD DREDGES MAKE A COMEBACK IN THE KLONDIKE THIS YEAR, AND INNOVATIVE TECHNIQUES FOR RECOVERING FINE GOLD ARE INTRODUCED ON A LARGE SCALE. EXPLORATION EXPENDITURES ARE EXPECTED TO BE MAINTAINED AT CURRENT LEVELS. EXPANSION OF CYPRUS ANVIL WILL ADD 260 JOBS DURING CONSTRUCTION AND SOME 200 PERMANENT EMPLOYEES BY 1983. FINALLY, A NUMBER OF MEDIUM-SIZED MINING OPERATIONS ARE EXPECTED TO BEGIN PRODUCTION OVER THE NEXT TWO YEARS TO MINE HIGH-GRADE DEPOSITS OF LEAD, ZINC, SILVER AND BARITE.

THE DECISION BY FOOTHILLS PIPELINE TO CONSTRUCT THE QUILL CREEK TEST SECTION FOR THE ALASKA HIGHWAY GAS PIPELINE AND ITS COMMITMENT TO COMMENCE SURVEYING RIGHT OF WAY AND CLEARING THE PIPELINE CORRIDOR WILL PROVIDE SIGNIFICANT OPPORTUNITY FOR YUKONERS TO BECOME INVOLVED AT AN EARLY STAGE IN THE PROPOSED PIPELINE. AS MUCH AS FIFTY MILLION DOLLARS COULD BE SPENT IN THE TERRITORY BY THE COMPANY IN 1981-82. THIS ACTIVITY REINFORCES OUR CONFIDENCE THAT THE PIPELINE WILL COMMENCE ON TIME AND ADD CONSIDERABLY TO OUR ECONOMY.

AS A RESULT OF THE COMPLETION OF THE QUILL CREEK TEST PROJECT, MY GOVERNMENT HAS BEEN ABLE TO GATHER VITAL INFORMATION WHICH WILL ENABLE US TO PLAN FOR MAINLINE CONSTRUCTION IN A MORE EFFECTIVE MANNER. WE HAVE BEEN ABLE TO VIEW ON A FIRST HAND BASIS ACTUAL PIPELINE CONSTRUCTION AND WE HAVE LEARNED A GREAT DEAL. CERTAINLY PROBLEMS HAVE BEEN IDENTIFIED BUT WE NOW HAVE THE OPPORTUNITY TO TAKE STEPS TO RESOLVE THESE ISSUES BEFORE PIPELINE CONSTRUCTION BEGINS, AND YOU CAN BE ASSURED THAT WE WILL DO OUR BEST TO FIND THE NECESSARY SOLUTIONS TO ENSURE YUKONERS REALIZE SUBSTANTIAL BENEFIT FROM THE PROJECT.

THE YUKON GOVERNMENT COST-SHARED PROGRAMS
INITIATED IN 1980 ARE EXPECTED TO BEAR SIGNIFICANT
FRUIT OVER THE NEXT FEW YEARS AS THE MILLIONS OF DOLLARS
ARE INJECTED INTO THE ECONOMY. THE MOST VISIBLE IMPACTS,
OF COURSE, WILL COME FROM THE EXPENDITURES OF THE SIX
MILLION DOLLAR CANADA YUKON TOURISM AGREEMENT; BUT THE
CONTRIBUTION PROVIDED UNDER THE ENERGY CONSERVATION
PROGRAM WILL PROVIDE LONG TERM SUPPORT IN THIS GOVERNMENT'S
DRIVE TO REDUCE ENERGY CONSUMPTION IN THE TERRITORY.

A GROUP OF SMALLER PROJECTS HAVE BEEN
ANNOUNCED TO BEGIN IN YUKON IN THE NEXT YEAR, AND THESE
PROJECTS WILL ADD SIGNIFICANTLY TO THE TRANSPORTATION AND
CONSTRUCTION INDUSTRY. THE OPENING OF A BARITE MINE,
TWO GOLD REFINERIES, A FOURTH WHEEL AT WHITEHORSE RAPIDS
DAM, AND THE HAINES JUNCTION HEALTH CENTRE ARE A FEW OF
THESE MANY PROJECTS.

THE DEPARTMENT OF HIGHWAYS AND PUBLIC WORKS WILL CONTINUE TO ASSIST IN THE ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT OF YUKON BY PROVIDING ENGINEERING ADVICE TO THE DEPARTMENT OF TOURISM AND ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AND SERVICES UNDER RECOVERY AGREEMENTS TO MINING AND EXPLORATION COMPANIES IN MATTERS CONCERNING TRANSPORTATION. TWO MORE TANGIBLE EXAMPLES WHICH MAY BE OF INTEREST ARE THE MAINTENANCE OF 33 KILOMETERS OF THE CARCROSS/SKAGWAY ROAD ON A COST RECOVERY BASIS FOR UNITED KENO HILL MINES, WHO ARE DEVELOPING THE VENUS MINE PROPERTY:

AND THE EARLY OPENING OF THE CANOL ROAD TO ALLOW THE HAULING OF EXPLORATION EQUIPMENT AND SUPPLIES TO THE MACMILLAN PASS AREA. THIS LATTER PROJECT IS COST SHARED BETWEEN MINING COMPANIES AND THE YUKON GOVERNMENT WHEREBY THE MINING COMPANIES PAY FOR COSTS OVER AND ABOVE ROAD OPENING COSTS THE YUKON WOULD HAVE NORMALLY INCURRED AT A LATER DATE. ALSO INCLUDED IN THE ROAD MAINTENANCE PROVISION ARE FUNDS FOR TRAINING TO UPGRADE CURRENT STAFF AND TO ALLOW FOR TRAINING OF RESIDENTS IN YUKON COMMUNITIES AS EQUIPMENT OPERATORS WHO WOULD NOT NORMALLY HAVE BEEN CONSIDERED FOR HIGHWAY MAINTENANCE POSITIONS DUE TO LACK OF KNOWLEDGE AND TRAINING. IT IS OUR SINCERE HOPE THAT THIS ADDITIONAL OPPORTUNITY MADE AVAILABLE TO YUKONERS WILL BE BENEFICIAL TO BOTH THE GOVERNMENT AND RESIDENTS BY BOTH PROVIDING YEAR-ROUND EMPLOYMENT AND CREATING A MORE STABLE WORK FORCE.

THE LONG PROMISED CUSTOMS STATION FOR BEAVER CREEK IS FINALLY TO BE BUILT. WE HAVE MADE DO WITH THE OLD IN ITS POOR LOCATION FOR MANY YEARS, BUT THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT HAS INFORMED MY GOVERNMENT THAT CONSTRUCTION OF THE NEW FACILITY WILL BEGIN THIS YEAR.

RESIDENTS OF COMMUNITIES OUTSIDE OF WHITEHORSE ARE AT TIMES HARD PRESSED TO AVAIL THEMSELVES OF NECESSARY GOVERNMENT SERVICES. MY GOVERNMENT HAS MADE A CONSCIOUS DECISION TO IMPROVE ACCESS TO THESE SERVICES WHENEVER POSSIBLE. THIS SIMPLY MEANS PUTTING THE SERVICES IN THE COMMUNITY. IN FOLLOWING OUR PROGRAM, WE HAVE PROVIDED FUNDS IN OUR CAPITAL BUDGET TO BUILD AN ADMINISTRATION BUILDING IN MAYO, WITH WORK TO COMMENCE THIS SUMMER.

THE CITY OF DAWSON HAS BEEN ALLOCATED MONIES UNDER THE TOURISM SUB-AGREEMENT WHICH WILL SEE SEVERAL NEW PROJECTS CARRIED OUT AND ADD TO THE ENHANCEMENT OF THE CITY AS ONE OF YUKON'S MAJOR TOURIST ATTRACTIONS. THIS FALL, A NEW INFORMATION CENTRE-Y.T.G. OFFICE BUILDING WILL BE STARTED AND COMPLETED FOR THE 1982 VISITOR SEASON. THE DOWNTOWN AREA OF DAWSON WILL RECEIVE NEW BOARDWALKS, SIGNS AND STREET UPGRADING THIS SUMMER AND A NEW BUILDING FACADE PROGRAM IS READY FOR IMPLEMENTATION. MY GOVERNMENT ALSO PLANS TO RESTORE THE CARNEGIE LIBRARY AND THEN PUT IT INTO USE AS THE DAWSON PUBLIC LIBRARY.

IN WATSON LAKE, WE ARE NEGOTIATING WITH THE COMMUNITY IN REGARDS TO A COMBINED INFORMATION CENTRE - MUSEUM AND HOPES TO REACH A DECISION AND GET WORK UNDERWAY AS SOON AS POSSIBLE.

THE GOVERNMENT INTENDS TO INTRODUCE AN AMENDMENT TO THE LANDS ORDINANCE AT THIS SESSION WHICH WILL PROVIDE GREATER FLEXIBILITY IN THE PRICING OF YUKON GOVERNMENT LAND. THIS FLEXIBILITY WILL ENABLE US TO SET THE PRICE OF LAND BASED ON USE AND LOCATION IN A MANNER WHICH BETTER MEETS THE ASPIRATIONS OF ALL YUKONERS, WHILE PRESERVING THE PRINCIPLE THAT WHERE DEVELOPMENT COSTS ARE INCURRED THEY BE FULLY RECOVERED THROUGH THE SALE OF LOTS.

MY GOVERNMENT WISHES TO REAFFIRM AT THIS
POINT THAT IT IS COMMITTED TO THE PRINCIPLE THAT
YUKONERS SHOULD HAVE THE RIGHT TO PURCHASE THE LAND
THEY USE. ACCORDINGLY, WE INTEND TO PROCEED WITH THE
SALE OF RECREATIONAL COTTAGE LOTS TO INTERESTED LESSEES.
THIS GOVERNMENT IS PLEASED THAT AFTER PROTRACTED
DISCUSSIONS, THE FEDERAL MINISTER RESPONSIBLE HAS AGREED
TO TRANSFER THE MAJORITY OF THE COTTAGE LEASES TO OUR
ADMINISTRATION.

PLANNING IS NOW VIRTUALLY COMPLETE AND DESIGNS FOR RURAL RESIDENTIAL DEVELOPMENTS ARE BEING FINALIZED. DISPOSAL AND PRICING POLICIES AND PROCESSES ARE BEING COMPLETED AND WILL BE IN PLACE SHORTLY.

ONCE THE NECESSARY CHANGES TO THE LANDS
ORDINANCE RESPECTING PRICE HAVE BEEN APPROVED BY THIS
HOUSE, AND THE MECHANICS OF THE TRANSFER PROCESS
COMPLETED, WE WILL BE IN A POSITION TO MAKE ATTRACTIVE
SALE OFFERS TO EXISTING LESSEES.

MR. SPEAKER, THE PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION IS CONTINUING TO DEVELOP AND IMPLEMENT POLICIES WHICH ENCOURAGE EMPLOYMENT OF YUKON RESIDENTS IN THEIR GOVERNMENT TO MEET THE DUAL CHALLENGES OF RISING LABOUR MARKET COSTS AND THE ASPIRATIONS OF YUKONERS TO PLAY A MAJOR ROLE IN THE ADMINISTRATION OF PUBLIC AFFAIRS IN YUKON. TO SUPPORT THE LOCAL HIRE POLICY, ADDITIONAL FUNDS WILL BE PROVIDED TO THE PUBLIC SERVICE COMMISSION TO EXPAND ITS IN-SERVICE TRAINING AND POST SECONDARY EDUCATION PROGRAMS.

MY GOVERNMENT'S CONCERN WITH TRAINING AND DEVELOPMENT OF PUBLIC SERVANTS SHOULD NOT, HOWEVER, BE REGARDED AS REFLECTING A SERVICE THAT IS ILL EQUIPPED TO DO ITS JOB. OUR PUBLIC SERVANTS COMPARE FAVOURABLY, IN EXPERTISE AND EXPERIENCE, WITH THOSE OF OTHER JURISDICTIONS AND ARE NOWHERE EXCELLED IN THEIR LOYALTY AND DEDICATION TO THE COMMUNITY THEY SERVE.

DURING THE COMING YEAR, THE COMPLETE OVERHAUL OF THE CLASSIFICATION AND PAY PLANS OF THE GOVERNMENT EMPLOYEES WILL COMMENCE WITH THE INCLUSION OF SENIOR AND MIDDLE MANAGEMENT POSITIONS IN ALL DEPARTMENTS OF THE GOVERNMENT INTO A SINGLE MANAGEMENT CLASSIFICATION AND PAY PLAN.

PLANNING HAS ALSO BEGUN ON A NEW "BRIDGING" CLASS AND UNDERFILL PLACEMENT WHICH WILL FACILITATE THE MOVEMENT OF CLERKS AND STENOGRAPHERS INTO ADMINISTRATIVE AND SPECIALIST POSITIONS. THE REVISED CLASSIFICATION AND PAY SYSTEM SHOULD ACHIEVE A REDUCTION OF THE PRESENT CLASSES BY AT LEAST FIFTY PERCENT.

WITH NO PESTITE FROM INFLATION AND A PATTERN OF MORE GENEROUS COLLECTIVE BARGAINING SETTLEMENTS IN BOTH THE PRIVATE AND PUBLIC SECTORS, YOUR GOVERNMENT ANTICIPATES CONTINUING UPWARD PRESSURE ON THE COSTS OF MANNING THE PUBLIC SERVICE AND WITH THESE INCREASES THE REQUIREMENT FOR RIGOROUS CONTROL OF THE PERMANENT ESTABLISHMENT. THE USE OF CONTRACT AND CASUAL EMPLOYEES WILL BE ENCOURAGED TO RETAIN MAXIMUM FLEXIBILITY IN THE ADJUSTMENT OF PROGRAMS TO MEET CHANGING PUBLIC NEEDS AND PRIORITIES.

THE GOVERNMENT OF CANADA AND THE GOVERNMENT
OF YUKON ARE PRESENTLY NEGOTIATING A NEW METHOD OF
BUDGET DEVELOPMENT. CURRENTLY THE YUKON BUDGET IS A
LINE ITEM IN THE DEPARTMENT OF INDIAN AND NORTHERN
AFFAIRS BUDGET AND SUBSEQUENTLY THE MINISTER OF THE DAY
DEFENDS THIS BUDGET BEFORE TREASURY BOARD. WHEN
NEGOTIATIONS ARE COMPLETED AND THAT WILL BE SOME TIME
YET OUR BUDGET WILL BE A SEPARATE LINE ITEM UNDER FINANCE

AND WE WILL NEGOTIATE AND DEFEND OUR OWN BUDGET WITH CANADA. THIS REPRESENTS ONE OF THE MOST INNOVATIVE STEPS TAKEN BY MY GOVERNMENT TO ENSURE THAT THE FISCAL RESPONSIBILITY EXHIBITED BY THIS GOVERNMENT IS MAINTAINED AND THE ACCOUNTABILITY FOR BUDGETARY MATTERS IS RETURNED TO YUKON.

SUBSTANTIAL AMENDMENTS TO THE TRANSPORT
PUBLIC UTILITIES ORDINANCE PASSED IN APRIL, 1980,
AND IMPLEMENTED IN NOVEMBER, 1980, WILL HAVE A
POSITIVE EFFECT IN SUPPORTING THE FURTHER GROWTH
OF THE YUKON TRANSPORTATION INDUSTRY. THE INCREASED
AUTHORITY PROVIDED TO THE TRANSPORT PUBLIC UTILITIES
BOARD AND THE VERY SUBSTANTIAL INCREASE IN FEES FOR
NON-RESIDENT PERMITS WILL ENSURE A GREATER OPPORTUNITY
FOR YUKON FIRMS TO PARTICIPATE IN THE TRANSPORTATION OF
GOODS TO THE TERRITORY. THE BOARD IS IN A POSITION TO
RESPOND MORE EFFECTIVELY TO THE CHANGING CONSUMER NEEDS
AND THE REQUIREMENTS OF YUKON BUSINESSES.

A NEW HIGH-PROFILE DEPARTMENT WHICH WE FEEL IS ESSENTIAL AT THIS TIME WILL BE PROPOSED TO YOU. REORGANIZATION WILL CREATE A DEPARTMENT OF INTERGOVERNMENTAL RELATIONS BY BRINGING TOGETHER THE INTERGOVERNMENTAL AFFAIRS DIRECTORATE, THE LAND CLAIMS SECRETARIAT, AND THE PIPELINE BRANCH. IN ADDITION TO THE AMALGAMATION OF THE AFOREMENTIONED AGENCIES, THE REORGANIZATION PROVIDES FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF A GOVERNMENT OF YUKON LIAISON OFFICE IN OTTAWA.

THIS NEW DEPARTMENT PROMISES TO PROVIDE THIS
GOVERNMENT WITH AN ENHANCED CAPABILITY IN THE AREA
OF INTERDEPARTMENTAL POLICY COORDINATION AND IN
THE MANAGEMENT OF OUR RELATIONS WITH OTHER ORDERS
OF GOVERNMENT.

MR. SPEAKER, INTERGOVERNMENTAL RELATIONS IS A MOST IMPORTANT ASPECT OF MY GOVERNMENT'S PROGRAM AS IT IS WITH ALL GOVERNMENTS IN CANADA. THE FIFTH ANNUAL HEADS OF GOVERNMENT MEETING WAS HELD IN LATE JANUARY BETWEEN THE HON. CHRIS PEARSON, GOVERNMENT LEADER, THE HON. WILLIAM BENNETT, PREMIER OF BRITISH COLUMBIA, AND GOVERNOR JAY HAMMOND OF ALASKA. THE HEADS OF GOVERNMENT DISCUSSED MANY ISSUES OF IMPORTANCE TO ALL THREE JURISDICTIONS, ONE SUBJECT WAS THE SHAKWAK PROJECT. MY GOVERNMENT HAS BEEN CONCERNED THAT WHILE FUNDING FOR THE PROJECT IS DUE TO RUN OUT THIS YEAR, IT IS FAR FROM COMPLETE. WE HAVE LOBBIED THE MINISTER OF INDIAN AND NORTHERN AFFAIRS AND THE UNITED STATES AMBASSADOR TO CANADA TO SEE IF THEY COULD HELP, GOVERNOR HAMMOND, AS A RESULT OF THE JANUARY MEETINGS, AGREED TO MAKE EVERY EFFORT TO HAVE THE ADDITIONAL 20 MILLION DOLLARS ALREADY APPROPRIATED BUT NOT RELEASED PUT IN THE BUDGET. THE SHAKWAK IS AN IMPORTANT TRANSPORTATION AND TOURISM ROUTE FOR YUKON AND WE WILL CONTINUE OUR EFFORTS TO SEE THAT THE PROJECT IS COMPLETED.

MR. SPEAKER, THE MINISTER OF HEALTH AND HUMAN RESOURCES IS INTRODUCING EXPANDED PROGRAMS THIS SESSION WHICH WILL ENHANCE SERVICES IN THE AREAS OF SENIOR CITIZENS, REHABILITATION AND ALCOHOL SERVICES AND CHILD CARE. ALL OF THESE WILL BE DETAILED IN THE BUDGET ADDRESS.

IN RECOGNITION OF THE NEEDS OF SENIOR CITIZENS, WHO ARE VERY OFTEN ON A FIXED INCOME, IT IS PROPOSED TO INCREASE THE PIONEER UTILITY GRANT FROM THREE HUNDRED DOLLARS TO THREE HUNDRED AND SIXTY DOLLARS PER YEAR. THE PROPOSED PHARMACARE FOR SENIORS PROGRAM IS BEING DEVELOPED AND A WHITE PAPER ON THIS WILL BE PRESENTED THIS SESSION.

REHABILITATION SERVICES, THROUGH THE
RE-ALLOCATION OF RESOURCES, HAS BEEN ABLE TO ESTABLISH
A THERAPEUTIC GROUP HOME WHICH WILL SERVE EIGHT
RESIDENTS. THIS IS PARTICULARLY TIMELY IN THE
INTERNATIONAL YEAR OF THE DISABLED. IN ORDER TO
PARTICIPATE IN THIS YEAR, AN ALLOCATION OF TEN THOUSAND
DOLLARS HAS BEEN MADE BY THE GOVERNMENT OF YUKON FOR
THE DEVELOPMENT OF COMMUNITY PROJECTS INVOLVING THE
DISABLED. A YUKON CITIZENS' COMMITTEE FOR THE
INTERNATIONAL YEAR OF THE DISABLED HAS BEEN ESTABLISHED
TO CO-ORDINATE ACTIVITIES.

IN ORDER TO AUGMENT EXISTING REHABILITATION AND HEALTH SERVICES, ADDITIONAL RESOURCES ARE BEING BUDGETED SO THAT AN ADDITIONAL SPEECH THERAPIST/ AUDIOLOGIST MIGHT BE RETAINED.

THE AREA OF ALCOHOL ABUSE HAS BEEN A CONTINUING CONCERN TO THIS GOVERNMENT AND ADDITIONAL FUNDS ARE BEING RECOMMENDED FOR AN EXTENSIVE ALCOHOL AWARENESS MEDIA CAMPAIGN AIMED AT REDUCING INCIDENCE OF ABUSE.

SERVICES TO JUVENILES CONTINUES TO BE A PRIORITY AND YOUTH SERVICES CENTRE PROGRAMS WILL BE RELOCATED FROM WOLF CREEK TO TWO SMALLER DOWNTOWN SETTINGS THIS SPRING.

THE PEOPLE OF YUKON AND THE YUKON TERRITORIAL PROGRESSIVE CONSERVATIVE ASSOCIATION ILLUSTRATED THEIR CONCERNS IN RESPECT OF DAYCARE AND, MR. SPEAKER, WE ARE PLEASED THAT WE WILL HAVE IN PLACE, FOR JULY 1, 1981, A DAY CARE ASSISTANCE PROGRAM BASED ON A SLIDING SCALE FEE SCHEDULE. IT IS FELT THAT THIS WILL MAKE DAY CARE ACCESSIBLE TO LOW INCOME WAGE EARNERS AND FURTHER THE USE OF QUALITY DAY CARE. A MORE DETAILED EXPLANATION OF THIS PROGRAM WILL ALSO BE PROVIDED IN THE BUDGET SPEECH.

THE YEAR AHEAD WILL ALSO SEE THE DEPARTMENT OF EDUCATION INSTITUTE IMPROVEMENTS TO EXISTING PROGRAMS AND SOME NEW ONES AS WELL. THE GOVERNMENT HAS RELEASED THE YUKON COLLEGE STUDY AND A SITE HAS BEEN CHOSEN IN TAKHINI - THE SITE HAS BEEN APPROVED BY THE CITY OF WHITEHORSE AND ARCHITECTURAL PLANS FOR PHASE I ARE UNDERWAY. THE YUKON VOCATIONAL AND TECHNICAL TRAINING CENTRE WILL INITIATE A NUMBER OF NEW PROGRAMS THIS YEAR IN THE AREAS OF APPRENTICESHIP TRAINING, BUSINESS ADMINISTRATION, CUSTODIAL AND BUSINESS SERVICES, PAINTING AND DECORATING, TRANSPORT DRIVING AND A VARIETY OF TRADES UP-GRADING COURSES. THESE NEW COURSES ARE BEING IMPLEMENTED TO MEET THE NEEDS EXPRESSED BY THE GENERAL PUBLIC AND INDUSTRY. WE ARE PLEASED TO HAVE THE INTEREST AND INPUT AND I AM PARTICULARLY PROUD THAT WE ARE ABLE TO PROVIDE THE COURSES NECESSARY TO MEET THE DEMAND.

ANIK EDUCATIONAL RECEIVING SYSTEMS ALREADY IN PLACE AT THE VOCATIONAL SCHOOL AND THE YUKON TEACHER EDUCATION FACILITIES WILL BE EXPANDED TO TWO ADDITIONAL YUKON COMMUNITIES, ONE OF WHICH WILL BE FARO.

THE DEPARTMENT IS CURRENTLY DEVELOPING A COMPREHENSIVE TRAINING PROGRAM TO ENABLE YUKONERS TO TAKE ADVANTAGE OF EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES AT THE TIME OF PIPELINE CONSTRUCTION.

EARLIER I OUTLINED MY GOVERNMENT'S COMMITMENT TO MAKING CERTAIN YUKONERS BENEFIT FROM THE PIPELINE.

THIS NEW TRAINING PROGRAM WILL BE AVAILABLE TO ANYONE WHO WISHES TO PARTICIPATE AND BECOME INVOLVED IN THE PIPELINE PROJECT. THE RESOURCE CORPS PROGRAM DESIGNED TO PROVIDE EMPLOYMENT OPPORTUNITIES FOR THE UNEMPLOYED AND THE DISADVANTAGED WILL CARRY OUT PROJECTS IN SEVERAL YUKON COMMUNITIES INCLUDING WHITEHORSE, CARMACKS AND MAYO.

MY GOVERNMENT KNOWS WHAT JOBS MEAN TO
YUKONERS AND WE WILL CONTINUE THROUGH THIS AND OTHER
PROGRAMS TO DO OUR BEST TO EITHER DIRECTLY OR
INDIRECTLY ENSURE THE OPPORTUNITIES ARE IN PLACE FOR
OUR LOCAL PEOPLE.

MR. SPEAKER, THE COMMUNITY OF PELLY CROSSING WILL SEE THE CONSTRUCTION OF THEIR NEW SCHOOL COMMENCE THIS YEAR. THE FUNDING APPROVAL HAS JUST BEEN RECEIVED FROM TREASURY BOARD, AND THE GOVERNMENT NOW PLANS TO FINALIZE THE DESIGN WITH THE PEOPLE OF PELLY, AND THEN PROCEED TO LET TENDERS. THE COMMUNITIES OF CARMACKS AND OLD CROW WILL SEE WORK BEGIN ON MAJOR ADDITIONS TO THEIR SCHOOLS IN THE COMING MONTHS. BOTH OF THESE PROGRAMS ARE DESIGNED TO PROVIDE MUCH NEEDED FACILITIES IN THE EXISTING SCHOOLS.

MY GOVERNMENT, MR. SPEAKER, AS I HAVE INDICATED PREVIOUSLY IS COMMITTED TO THE PRINCIPLE THAT WE MUST ACHIEVE A GREATER CONTROL OF MATTERS WHICH DIRECTLY AFFECT YUKONERS. TO THIS END, WE PLAN TO CONTINUE OUR EFFORTS TO SEE THE HEALTH TRANSFER COMPLETED THIS YEAR, AND WE ARE ANTICIPATING THAT SERIOUS DISCUSSIONS WILL TAKE PLACE CONCERNING THE TRANSFER OF FISHERIES FROM THE FEDERAL GOVERNMENT TO THE YUKON GOVERNMENT. THE FUNCTION OF THE SOLICITOR GENERAL IS YET ANOTHER PROVINCIAL RESPONSIBILITY WHICH WE WILL EXAMINE SOON, AND IN TALKS WITH OUR FEDERAL COLLEAGUES, DETERMINE WHETHER WE SHOULD CONSIDER ASSUMING THIS RESPONSIBILITY.

LAND CLAIMS, MR. SPEAKER, IS CONSIDERED TO BE OF THE UTMOST PRIORITY BY MY GOVERNMENT. THE YUKON INDIAN LAND CLAIM IS PROGRESSING VERY WELL AND WE ARE LOOKING TOWARDS AN AGREEMENT IN PRINCIPLE BY THIS FALL. WE RECOGNIZE THAT A FAIR AND JUST SETTLEMENT OF THE CLAIM IS ESSENTIAL TO ALL OF US IN THE TERRITORY. WE BELIEVE OUR COLLECTIVE FUTURE LIES IN CO-OPERATION AMONG YUKONERS REGARDLESS OF THEIR ORIGINS AND WE WILL ENCOURAGE YUKON INDIANS TO WORK WITH US TO BUILD A ONE GOVERNMENT SYSTEM TO SERVE ALL CITIZENS.

THE COPE NEGOTIATIONS ARE AT A STANDSTILL.

WE HAVE PRESENTED OUR NORTH YUKON RESOURCE MANAGEMENT

MODEL, AND THE MINISTER OF INDIAN AND NORTHERN AFFAIRS

HAS ISSUED CLEAR INSTRUCTIONS TO THE FEDERAL NEGOTIATOR,

SENATOR STEUART. WE LOOK FORWARD TO GETTING BACK TO

THE TABLE AND RESOLVING THIS VERY SERIOUS ISSUE.

A MAJOR CONCERN OF MY GOVERNMENT, MR. SPEAKER, IS THE CONSERVATION OF OUR GAME POPULATIONS THROUGHOUT YUKON. KEEPING IN MIND OUR PHILOSOPHY THAT RESIDENT HUNTERS HAVE PREFERENCE IN RESPECT TO THE HARVESTING OF OUR GAME POPULATION, IT IS OUR INTENTION TO BRING FORWARD DURING THE MONTH OF APRIL A LONG TERM POLICY FOR THE OUTFITTING INDUSTRY.

MR. SPEAKER, AN IMPORTANT DOCUMENT TO BE TABLED AT THIS SESSION IS THE EXECUTIVE COUNCIL CODE OF CONDUCT REGARDING CONFLICT OF INTEREST. THE CONFLICT OF INTEREST GUIDELINES FOR MLA'S WERE AMENDED AT THE LAST SITTING OF THIS HOUSE, AND THIS NEW CODE OF CONDUCT BRINGS THE MEMBERS OF CABINET INTO LINE WITH THOSE GUIDELINES.

DURING THIS SESSION, MR. SPEAKER, YOU WILL
BE ASKED TO CONSIDER A NUMBER OF FINANCIAL BILLS IN
ADDITION TO A LANDS ORDINANCE, A MISCELLANEOUS STATUTE
LAW AMENDMENT ORDINANCE, A PETTY TRESPASS ORDINANCE,
AN INTERNATIONAL CHILD ABDUCTION (HAGUE CONVENTION)
ORDINANCE, A SURVIVAL OF ACTION ORDINANCE, AN
ORDINANCE TO PERPETUATE A CERTAIN ANCIENT RIGHT, AND
AN INTERPROVINCIAL SUBPOENA ORDINANCE.

MY GOVERNMENT, MR. SPEAKER, AS YOU CAN SEE IS WORKING VERY HARD TO IMPROVE THE QUALITY OF LIFE IN YUKON AND WE WILL CONTINUE OUR EFFORTS IN THE COMING YEAR. WE ARE TAKING SPECIFIC STEPS TO EXPAND YUKON'S ECONOMIC BASE IN A MANNER WHICH HAS AS ITS THRUST A TOTAL PLANNED APPROACH. IT IS OUR POLICY THAT ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT MUST ENCOMPASS SOCIAL AND EDUCATIONAL PLANNING AS WELL AS EMPLOYMENT AND BUSINESS OPPORTUNITIES.

MR. SPEAKER, AS YOU CAN SEE, WE ARE A GOVERNMENT CONCERNED, AND ACTING, ON THE EDUCATION OF OUR YOUTH, THE PROMOTION OF SMALL BUSINESS, THE BACKBONE OF OUR INDUSTRY, THE DEVELOPMENT OF LARGER PROJECTS FOR THE EMPLOYMENT OF OUR SKILLED TRADESMEN, AND ON THE CARE OF OUR PIONEERS. WE KNOW, MR. SPEAKER, THAT A COUNTRY ADVANCES ONLY ON THE EFFORTS AND ACHIEVEMENTS OF THE INDIVIDUAL. WORKING TOGETHER AS YUKONERS WE CAN ACHIEVE THAT WHICH WE DARE TO DREAM. IT IS THIS GOVERNMENT'S DESIRE TO LEAD YUKONERS TO THE FULFILLMENT OF THOSE DREAMS.

#### QUESTION OF PRIVILEGE - RESIGNATION OF MEMBER

#### QUESTION OF PRIVILEGE

The Speaker delivered a reserved decision as follows:

On April 7th, the Hon. Member for Whitehorse West rose on a question of Privilege. The Hon. Member stated "I do not believe it is competent for a Member to impute motives to another member of this House, especially if those motives are false and not founded on fact."

Annotation 319(3), Beauchesne 5 Edition, points out that "In the House of Commons, a Member will not be permitted by the Speaker to indulge in any reflections on the House itself as a political institution, or to impute to any Member or Members unworthy motives for their actions in a particular case."

Annotation 19(1) also points out that a dispute arising between two Members as to allegation of facts does not fulfill the conditions of Parliamentary Privilege.

In this matter it is clear that there is a dispute before the House as to an allegation of facts. Further, on review of Hansard, I can find no instance of imputation of unworthy motives. Therefore, I am unable to find that a prima facie case of privilege has been placed before the House.

AND WHEREAS the aforesaid Members recognize the present aboriginal rights of Yukon Indian People and are desirous that they be recognized and affirmed in the Canadian Constitution, but in a manner that will not impede the settlement of the Yukon Indian Land Claims and the ultimate entrenchment of the settlement legislation;

BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Members of the Yukon Legislative Assembly urge the affirmation of the aboriginal and treaty rights of the Aboriginal Peoples of Canada in the Canadian Constitution provided that the aboriginal rights shall be construed as having the legal status of rights cognizable at common law;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED THAT the Members of the Yukon Legislative Assembly urge that provision be made in the Canadian Constitution whereby the aboriginal rights of Yukon Indian People may be extinguished and replaced by new clearly defined rights to be negotiated and enacted in settlement legislation and entrenched in the Canadian Constitution.

  - "30(1)(g) for referring a bill to a Select Committee after First Reading;";

  - "30(1.1) Two clear days' notice shall be given of a motion for concurrence in the report of any Select Committee.";
- (8) adding the expression "excepting proposed amendments to a bill at the Select Committee report stage" at the end of Standing Order 30(2)(b);
- (9) striking out the expression "Standing or Special" and the word "Standing" wherever they occur in Standing Order 46;

- (10) adding the following new Standing Order:
  - "57(1.1) Notwithstanding Standing Order 57(1) a bill may be committed to a Select Committee after First Reading.";
- (11) striking out Standing Order 58 and substituting for it the following new Standing Orders:
  - "58.(1) During formal proceedings in any committee of the House upon bills, the preamble and title are first postponed, and if the first clause contains only a short title, it is also postponed; then every other clause is considered by the committee in its proper order, the first clause (if it contains only the short title), the preamble and the title to be last considered.
    - (2) All amendments made in any committee shall be reported by the Chairman to the Assembly.
    - 58.1(1) The consideration of the report stage of a bill from the Committee of the Whole shall be received and forthwith disposed of, without amendment or debate.
      - (2) A bill reported without amendment by the Chairman of the Committee of the Whole is forthwith ordered to be read a third time at such time as may be appointed by the Assembly.
      - (3) A bill reported with amendment by the Chairman of the Committee of the Whole shall not be read a third time until the following sitting day or such other time after the following sitting day as may be appointed by the Assembly.
    - 58.2(1) When the order for Third Reading of a bill is read a motion may be made to discharge the order and recommit the bill.
      - (2) When a bill has been read the third time and passed a motion may be made to rescind the Third Reading and passing and recommit the bill."; and

- (12) adding the new heading "Reports of Select Committees" and the following new Standing Orders:
  - "60.1(1) The report of a Select Committee on a bill which has received First Reading only shall be accepted by the Assembly, but may not be further proceeded with until such time as the bill has received Second Reading.
    - (2) Following the Second Reading of a bill previously reported from a Select Committee, notice of a motion for concurrence in the report of the Select Committee will be accepted.
    - (3) In cases under Standing Order 60.1(2) the Select Committee proceedings shall be deemed to have occurred after Second Reading.
    - 60.2(1) A motion for concurrence in the report of a Select Committee must receive at least two clear days' notice.
      - (2) A motion to amend, delete, insert or restore any clause in a bill will be allowed during debate on a concurrence motion if written notice of such motion has been given to the Clerk prior to 5:00 p.m. on the sitting day before the concurrence motion is called.
      - (3) The Clerk will deliver a copy of the notices of motions received under Standing Order 60.2(2) to all members.
  - 60.3(1) When the concurrence motion is called the Speaker shall first allow a general debate following the normal rules of the Assembly. If notice of amendments to the bill has been given, however, he shall postpone putting the main question until such amendments have been disposed of.
    - (2) Following the general debate on the concurrence motion any amendment to the bill of which notice has been given shall be open to debate and amendment.

- (3) When debate is permitted, no member shall speak more than once or longer than twenty minutes during proceedings on any amendment.
- (4) The Speaker shall have power to select or combine amendments to be proposed.
- (5) When a recorded division has been demanded on any amendment proposed, the Speaker may defer the calling in of the members for the purpose of recording the "yeas" and "nays" until any or all subsequent amendments proposed to the bill have been considered. A recorded division or divisions may be so deferred from sitting to sitting.
- (6) An amendment, in relation to form only in a Government Bill, may be proposed by a Minister without notice, but debate thereon may not be extended to provisions of the clause or clauses to be amended.
- (7) When all proceedings on amendments have been completed the Speaker shall put the question on the concurrence motion forthwith.
- (8) Where necessary, the Speaker is empowered to add the phrase "as amended" to the concurrence motion.
- (9) When a bill has been amended during the proceedings of a Select Committee it shall not receive Third Reading on the same sitting day as the concurrence motion is dealt with by the House."

#### QUESTION OF PRIVILEGE

The Speaker delivered a reserved decision as follows:

At this time I would like to inform the House of my thoughts on the question of privilege raised by the Minister of Justice on November 24, 1981. He rose in the House on that day and stated:

I rise on a point of personal privilege today to deal with a matter that has been uppermost in my mind for the last couple of days. I have been accused by members across the floor and by the press and the media in this Territory for what they are implying are illegal acts on my part.

The role of the Speaker, as set out in Standing Order 16(4), is to determine whether the matter has been raised at the earliest opportunity and whether there appears to be a <u>prima facie</u> case of privilege.

It is difficult for the Chair to make a determination in this matter. The Minister of Justice has failed to identify when and where offending remarks have been made by members of this House or by the media. The member did mention the Whitehorse Star but he did not have the offending remarks read into the

record as is required in our parliamentary practice. The Chair has, therefore, found it impossible to determine whether the question of privilege has been raised at the earliest possible opportunity.

The Chair would like to point out the remarks made by the Leader of the Official Opposition and by the Member for Whitehorse Riverdale South when speaking to the question raised by the Minister of Justice. The Leader of the Official Opposition stated:

On my part whatever general aspersions the member opposite may have cast on this side of the House, I have not mentioned his name in connection with this question nor have I made any allegations against the Minister.

Following that, the Member for Whitehorse Riverdale South said:

Let me make it clear that there have been, to my knowledge, no allegations of dishonesty against the member by members on this side nor allegations of illegality.

I trust the honourable Minister of Justice will accept, as the Chair does, the word of these honourable members in this matter.

Not knowing exactly what troubles the Minister of Justice in the publishings of the Whitehorse Star, the Chair does not feel it can say whether or not there appears to be a prima facie case of privilege.

In any event the Chair would wish members to consider the nature of privilege and its use in dealing with libel before pursuing the matter in the House.

Privilege is designed to enable Parliament and its members to carry out their functions without hindrance and obstruction. It exists to protect the authority and dignity of Parliament as an institution, to enable members to speak and participate in the proceedings of the House and its committees with total and uninhibited freedom, to protect members from intimidation, molestation, and any other form of undue pressure, and to empower Parliament to

punish those who seek to bring the institution into contempt or disrepute or obstruct its members or officers in the performance of their duties.

When using a media publication as a basis for raising a question of privilege all members should give thought to whether the publication is really a violation of a member's or the House's privileges or whether it is, in fact, a libel of a more private nature. As stated by Enid Campbell (Parliamentary Privilege in Australia):

No one denies that reputations can be impaired by falsehoods and derogatory remarks or that sustained smear campaigns against governmental agencies can undermine public respect and confidence, but freedom of expression is such a precious commodity that its restriction seems justifiable only where some clear and demonstrable harm will most surely result from its exercise. In a democracy the liberty of the citizen to criticize his government is all-important and certainly is not something to be tampered with because of some more-or-less remote possibility that criticism may lessen respect for governmental authority or excite dissatisfaction with existing institutions.

In cases where there is a libel relating to an individual rather than to the parliamentary institution the individual will generally find it possible to seek redress in the courts and the Minister of Justice has indicated his intention to examine that possibility.

In finding that there does not appear to be a <u>prima</u> <u>facie</u> case of privilege I should like to point out to the House that this finding only restricts the House from dealing with the matter immediately. The Speaker cannot determine whether there has actually been a breach of privilege; only the Assembly can do this. When the Speaker states there does not appear to be a case of privilege and the Assembly disagrees it may take action through a motion of which notice is given and which is dealt with in the normal way.

I thank the House for its patience in listening to this lengthy ruling and hope that it has been useful in clarifying this matter and the position of the Speaker in dealing with questions of privilege.
