RE: Tracking and reporting health and safety

The response is as follows:

Yes. The Public Service Commission (PSC) collects occupational health and safety information from departments, including incident and workplace inspection information received through department health and safety committees. PSC consolidates this information to report to the Health and Safety Leadership Committee, which is co-chaired by the Public Service Commissioner and a deputy minister and includes union representatives as members.

PSC also prepares reports on injuries reported to the Workers' Safety and Compensation Board (WSCB). The most recent WSCB claims reporting available at this time covers July 1, 2025 to September 30, 2025 and shows 21 incidents resulting in claims across the Yukon government. Committee-based incident reporting practices can vary across workplaces and PSC is working to improve consistency in how information is captured and reported. PSC has recently launched a digital safety management system for reporting incidents, hazards, and workplace inspections, and will transition to generating reports through this system over 2026-27 to support more standardized and accurate data collection.
