

# LEGISLATIVE RETURN

RE: We are beyond the deadline for completing the civic address database by the end of 2024. Was the target met and, if not, when can Yukoners expect a complete territory-wide civic addressing?

The response is as follows:

The target to complete civic addressing for unincorporated areas and local advisory areas was substantially met through a project completed in 2015. Since then, the Department of Community Services has continued to update the database as changes are required or issues are identified. Residents who are aware of an issue with their civic address can report it to [civic.address.data@yukon.ca](mailto:civic.address.data@yukon.ca) for review and correction.

Civic addressing information is critical for emergency response, land management, and public service delivery. It is used by emergency responders, residents, Yukon government departments, municipalities, First Nation governments, utilities, telecommunications providers, and other service organizations.

The Yukon government is currently the addressing authority for unincorporated areas, while municipalities manage addressing within municipal boundaries and First Nations manage addressing on settlement lands. At present, there is no single Yukon government department with comprehensive legislative authority for civic addressing, and the data is maintained collaboratively across departments and jurisdictions.

Over the past several years, Yukon has made significant progress in modernizing civic addressing across the territory. Yukon now has a single, territory-wide civic address system, improved data standards, modern mapping tools, and public access to official civic addresses. This work has strengthened emergency response capabilities and improved overall readiness for Next Generation 9-1-1 compared to previous conditions.

We are aware that civic addressing will need to continuously be updated and be edited to meet the needs of growing communities. Yukon Government remains committed to working with authorities having jurisdiction, local advisory areas and unincorporated communities to maintain up to date civic addressing and information.
