The response is as follows:

All reasonable costs related to removing an abandoned vehicle and its storage is a debt owing to the Government of Yukon.

Abandoned Vehicle Process: If the abandoned vehicle presents an immediate safety concern, we will move the vehicle so that it does not interfere with road maintenance activities or with traffic on the highway. Motor Vehicles will pay the towing operator invoice and will then recover the costs from the last known registered owner.

When there is no immediate safety concern, Motor Vehicles contacts the last registered owner and requests that they remove the vehicle. However, if the vehicle is left for more than 72 consecutive hours it is deemed to be abandoned and will be removed from its location, whether it's on private property, public property or highway and will be stored.

In both circumstances noted above, the last known registered owner(s) is sent a registered letter from Motor Vehicles that:

- identifies the costs associated with the towing and storing of the abandoned vehicle; and
- notifies the owner that these costs must be paid and the vehicle must be removed from the storage facility within 30 days.

Vehicles that are still in the possession of the towing company, after the 30-day notification period, will be liquidated and Motor Vehicles is responsible for paying the tow operators for any costs associated with the tow, storage and disposal of the vehicle.

Reporting Abandoned Vehicles: The public should report abandoned vehicles to the RCMP. Once the RCMP completes an investigation, the report is provided to Motor Vehicles. On receiving the RCMP report, Motor Vehicles will contact the last registered owner and request that they remove the vehicle.

Tow Operator Compensation: In an effort to address tow operator concerns regarding the compensation process for costs incurred as a result of removing abandoned vehicles, Motor Vehicles has implemented a strict process that must be adhered to by officers and tow operators alike. This process ensures that the legislative requirements are met and that tow operators are compensated for the valuable service that they provide.

Impound Rates: The *Motor Vehicles Act* is scheduled to be reviewed in the near future. When the *Motor Vehicles Act* and Motor Vehicle Regulations are open for review, the recommendations put forth will be taken into consideration.
