The response is as follows:

As indicated in the department's 2016 Annual Report, the Departments of Education and Highways and Public Works are responsible for the planning, monitoring, and maintenance of Yukon school buildings. The Department of Education's 2016 Annual Report contains several examples of the recent work that has been completed to maintain and improve school buildings, and this work is ongoing.

The Annual Report also indicates that a number of older school buildings will need to be replaced or renovated in the coming years, and that the government is working on a long term plan to spread the cost of school upgrades and replacements over a reasonable period of time. Schools that are currently being considered for renovation or replacement include Whitehorse Elementary School, Kluane Lake School, Selkirk Elementary School, Takhini Elementary School, Wood Street Centre, St. Elias Community School, and Christ the King Elementary School.

This planning has culminated in the identification of several schools as a priority for renovation and/or construction over the period 2018 to 2024. A number of these projects are being considered as part of the Department of Education's 2018/2019 Five Year Capital Plan, which has not yet been approved. It is expected that the Five Year Capital Plan will be approved in the Spring of 2018.

With a proper planning process that includes functional plans and business cases, the government will continue to make informed decisions on how to best revitalize and replace our schools.
