MOTIONS OTHER THAN GOVERNMENT MOTIONS

1. Mr. Elias (Motion #252)

THAT this House supports the Minister of Community Services, who is responsible for sport and recreation, in her pan-northern efforts to ensure that the sports of speed skating, figure skating, curling, gymnastics, midget hockey and dog mushing are included in the 2016 Arctic Winter Games.

2. Mr. Tredger (Motion #275)

THAT this House urges the Government of Yukon to:

- (1) implement an immediate moratorium,
- (2) conduct a full and rigorous scientific review; and
- (3) conduct a public consultation

on the effects and desirability of hydraulic fracturing, also known as "fracking", before any regulatory approvals or permitting is allowed in Yukon.

3. Mr. Silver (Motion #249)

THAT this House urges the Government of Yukon to work with emergency services personnel and fire officials in Dawson City to establish 911 service in that community.

4. Mr. Silver (Motion #251)

That this House urges the Government of Yukon to correct the mistakes made in the Peel Land Use Planning Process when it begins work on other plans by:

- (1) sending clear and specific direction regarding the nature of changes it desires to the particular land use planning commission to ensure the plan's approval and implementation; and
- (2) developing an effective implementation plan.

GOVERNMENT MOTIONS

1. Hon. Mr. Dixon (Motion #119)

THAT this House urges the Government of Yukon to develop and implement a Yukon Water Strategy that will help provide long-term direction for economically and environmentally responsible development, management, and use of water in Yukon and establish principles to guide future decision making.

2. Hon. Mr. Cathers (Motion #211)

THAT this House urges the Yukon Government to continue to:

- (1) respect the fact that there are many hundreds of families in Yukon that depend upon mineral exploration in order to make their mortgage payments, feed themselves, and ensure a proper education and a bright future for their children; and
- (2) support responsible mineral exploration and responsible mining as key elements of a strong, diversified Yukon economy.
- 3. Hon. Mr. Dixon (Motion #212)

THAT this House urges the Government of Yukon to continue to work with industry, First Nations, and non-governmental organizations to:

- (1) attract investment to Yukon; and
- (2) encourage the development of responsible economic projects.
- 4. Hon. Mr. Kent (Motion #213)

That this House urges the Government of Yukon to work with Yukon College, the Yukon Mine Training Association, and the mining and exploration industries to train and develop a skilled work force made up of Yukon residents to meet the current and future needs of the mining and resource sectors.

5. Hon. Mr. Cathers (Motion #215)

THAT this House urges the Government of Yukon to continue to work with the Yukon Water Board and the Yukon Environmental and Socio-economic Assessment Board to improve Yukon's assessment and regulatory processes.

6. Hon. Mr. Pasloski (Motion #216)

THAT this House urges the Government of Yukon to preserve and maintain the Free Entry System of mineral allocation in Yukon.

7. Hon. Mr. Nixon (Motion #219)

THAT this House urges the Government of Yukon to continue to work with Public Safety Canada and the Royal Canadian Mounted Police to:

- (1) implement the new twenty-year agreement with the Government of Canada for the provision of police services,
- (2) support the RCMP in the provision of a professional, effective and efficient territorial police service that is responsive to the needs of all Yukon communities,
- (3) address street crime; and
- (4) implement the recommendations of the Sharing Common Ground report.

THAT this House urges the Government of Yukon to implement the 2012 Aishihik Bison Herd Management Plan, which includes allowing a Fall hunt in selected areas, reducing the cost of the seal from fifty dollars to ten dollars, and maintaining hunting as the primary management tool.

THAT this House urges the Government of Yukon to implement initiatives that will enhance the safety of oil-fired appliances, including regulatory and/or legislative changes, public awareness and training initiatives for industry, based on the report of the Oil-Fired Appliance Working Group and input received from Yukon citizens, municipal and First Nation governments, industry and other interested groups during the community tour that took place in September and early October 2012.

MOTIONS OTHER THAN GOVERNMENT MOTIONS

1. Ms. McLeod (Motion #277)

THAT this House urges the Government of Yukon to engage First Nations and Renewable Resource Councils to implement the recommendations set out in the 2011 Yukon Wolf Conservation and Management Plan, which addresses concerns over the management of wolves in Yukon through small scale, local approaches, and respects roles identified in the Yukon Land Claims Agreements.

2. Mr. Hassard (Motion #278)

THAT this House urges the Government of Yukon to continue to work collaboratively with other Canadian federal, provincial and territorial governments, through the Canadian Council of Ministers of the Environment, to encourage an industry-led initiative that will reduce packaging in Canada and will include the following four specific commitments by industry:

- (1) continuing to eliminate polyvinyl chloride (PVC) from ridged plastic packaging,
- (2) developing a database on the current use of packaging in Canada by 2014,
- (3) developing a voluntary packaging design guide based on Éco Enterprises Québec's voluntary code and other international standards; and
- (4) improving communications with the public on packaging reduction.

3. Ms. Stick (Motion #279)

THAT this House urges the Government of Yukon to make government business more open and transparent by:

- (1) withdrawing Bill #48, Act to Amend the Access to Information and Protection of Privacy Act,
- (2) proactively disclosing documents and public information across government; and
- (3) consulting with the public, media organizations and information and privacy experts prior to introducing amendments to the Access to Information and Protection of Privacy Act to increase access to information while protecting privacy.

4. Mr. Silver (Motion #280)

THAT this House urges the Government of Yukon to ensure a supervisor is in place in order to allow International Medical Graduates to practice in Yukon, while they are obtaining their Canadian certification.

5. Mr. Silver (Motion #281)

THAT this House urges the Government of Yukon to call Bill #49, Act to Amend the Oil and Gas Act, for second reading debate without delay.

6. Mr. Silver (Motion #282)

THAT this House urges the Government of Yukon to award grade 12 excellence awards based on 80% of the final course mark to ensure Yukon students are not penalized by the recent termination of standardized exams.
