THAT this House urges the Government of Yukon to work with:

- (1) the private sector to provide for the sale of cannabis via the private sector; and
- (2) the Government of Canada to regulate the use of cannabis edibles.

2. Motion No. 424

Ms. Hanson, Leader of the Third Party

THAT this House urges the Government of Yukon, in the interest of economic, social and public certainty, to establish an independent expert commission similar to the 1992 Schwindt Commission; and

THAT the commission be charged with developing principles to guide Yukon government policy with respect to expropriating and compensating renewable and non-renewable claim holders in the event that a land use plan determines that public uses take precedence over those existing claims; and

THAT the commission be charged with considering public policy principles including but not limited to:

- (1) that compensation policies should not induce private investment in resources may have a higher value in public use;
- (2) that taxpayers are to be protected against being made insurers against the risk of expropriation;
- (3) that a methodology is required to determine the value of investments made and the compensation, if any, that might be paid if there was a decision made not to allow further mining exploration or development in a given area; and
- (4) that there be recognition of the significant federal and Yukon incentives, tax deductions et cetera provided to investors in mining exploration activities.
