THAT this House urges the Government of Yukon to condemn anti-Semitism and all forms of religious discrimination.

- (3) increasing access to resources for equipment and training to support food-safe and ethical on-site slaughter; and
- (4) working with local meat producers and abattoirs to ensure the viability of year-round slaughter.
